Debwewin

To speak only to the extent, we have lived or experienced. Commonly referred to as Truth.

Dabasendiziwin

To think lower of oneself in relation to all that sustains us. Commonly referred to as Humility.

Manaaji'idiwin

To go easy on one another and all of Creation. Commonly referred to as Respect.

Zaagi'idiwin

Unconditional love between one another including all of Creation, humans and non-humans. Commonly referred to as Love.

Gwayakwaadiziwin

To live correctly and with virtue. Commonly referred to as Honesty.

Zoongide'ewin

To live with a solid, strong heart. Commonly referred to as Bravery or Courage.

Nibwaakaawin

To live with vision. Commonly referred to as Wisdom.

HONOURING OUR ELDERS



Our Elders have been meeting on a bi-weekly basis via phone conference. Our Cultural team includes support for access to land-based practices, medicines, ceremonies, and presence of an Elder and/or Knowledge Keeper on site for access to children, youth, and families at their request.

Although COVID – 19 is in place, our Elders continue to show our community support by guiding us during this time. Our Elders have dedicated themselves through:

HONOURING OUR COMMUNITY

Addiction & Mental Health Services

BZA's National Native Alcohol and Drug Abuse Program (NNADP) worker is responsible for the planning, facilitating and implementation of our program to promote a healthy drug and alcohol-free lifestyle. Our addiction worker provides many opportunities to support change and offer harm reduction techniques and options for treatment services.



BZA's Community Mental Wellness Worker (CMWW) has been actively involved in assisting our entire community on/off reserve by connecting with Elders, adults, youth and children to advocate and achieve wholistic wellbeing. Our Nations people can connect with the Community Mental Wellness worker at any time for individual, couples or group wellness sessions in very time efficient manner. The CMWW has made themselves available at various times during the recent pandemic by all forms of technology and communication.



We will support our families by providing prevention & intervention services.

Social Repatriation Worker

The Social/Repatriation Worker has been providing support to the membership of Rocky Bay First Nation, Biinjitiwaabik Zaaging Anishinaabek. By ensuring children establish or reestablish ties between, their families and the community.

Jordan's Principle Worker

The Jordan's Principle Worker has provided on-going support, for families and their children both on/off reserve to access the products, services and supports they need, when they need them.

Band Representative

The Band Representative has been providing support and advocacy to the membership of Rocky Bay First Nation, Biinjitiwaabik Zaaging Anishinaabek. The Band Rep has been supporting our families who are involved with the Children's Aid Society to ensure that the rights of our families and children are being respected by the CAS.





Parent/Volunteer Committee

Rocky Bay Family Services Volunteer Committee have been working diligently by providing online activities for our families. So far, our volunteer committee has raised over \$1000. All proceeds go to cover the cost of online contest. All BZA members are encouraged to participate. Thank you to our Volunteer Committee for your continued support during this time. BZA COVID-19 Health & Safety Pandemic Team

Since March 2020 when COVID-19 was announced, Chief and Council had made the decision to form a Health & Safety Committee. The Pandemic team was created to ensure the wellbeing & safety of our community. The Pandemic Team met weekly to provide updates to ensure that safety measures were put in place. The pandemic team made plans to ensure food security was made available for all our members, they also set up a security team to monitor the highway to protect our members from Covid-19. During this time BZA was able to purchase a Cube Van to help assist our families with food deliveries.

The Pandemic Team continue to meet on a bi-weekly basis, and we want to thank our community members for being patient during this time.
